Memorandum of Understanding

between

King's Health Partners and Human First Partners

Background:

With this Memorandum of Understanding Human First and King's Health Partners Academic Health Sciences Centre (here forth "the parties") express a shared desire to support, strengthen and promote local and global research and education efforts in health care and to leverage the interaction of research, education, and practice to the mutual benefit of the joining parties.

Human First is a partnership in healthcare that aims to reach the fulfilment of a shared dream to make the central Denmark region the healthiest place in the world. The vision of the collaborative partnership Human First is to cooperate on ground breaking research and intelligent education - for better health and society.

King's Health Partners is an Academic Health Sciences Centre, based in London, where world-class research, education and clinical practice are brought together for the benefit of patients. King's Health Partners translate cutting-edge research and existing best practice into excellent patient care.

Purpose:

In order to accomplish the objectives set forth in this memorandum of understanding, both parties mutually agree to the following:

- This Memorandum of Understanding is one of mutual collaboration in pursuit of objectives expressed herein, and nothing in this Memorandum of Understanding shall be construed or understood as a legally binding relationship between the parties
- In order to carry out the activities, a detailed action plan may be agreed to upon consultation between the two partners which may take the form of an addendum to this Memorandum of Understanding.

Content:

- 1. Shared interest for collaboration includes the areas mentioned below. Within each area the potential for mutual development should subsequently be examined, specified and operationalized starting with neuroscience and rehabilitation.
 - Promoting the culture of value
 - · Developing research collaboration for all staff groups

- Developing education and training
- Clinical Academic Group collaboration
- Developing informatics and data collaboration
- 2. Based on the principles of mutual benefit and respect for each other's independence, the parties will work to foster collaboration applying instruments such as but not limited to:
 - a) Organization of joint events, conferences, seminars, symposiums and talks
 - b) Exchange of experts and delegations
 - c) Open exchange of knowledge and information in the field of health
 - d) Education and training hubs, incl. online learning/resources
 - e) Joint research projects.
- 3. Any activity carried out within the broad framework of this Memorandum of Understanding shall be subject to the mutual consent of the parties taking into account constraints of time, funding and other relevant resources.
- 4. Each activity shall be governed by terms and conditions to be separately negotiated and mutually agreed by the parties through an exchange of letters or the signing of a separate joint agreement.
- Except as expressly provided herein, neither party will be liable to the other for any costs, expenses, risks or liabilities arising out of the implementation of this Memorandum of Understanding.

Commencement and termination:

It is to be understood that the implementation of this Memorandum of Understanding will commence on the day of signature, and will continue thereafter for XX years, subject from time to time to revision or modification by mutual agreement. Representatives from both institutions will discuss the terms of a renewal at least six months prior to the natural termination of the current Memorandum of Understanding.
